President's Report

Mr. Carbone began his report by honoring Lew Miller, a long-term Board member of TWP & former chairman. Mr. Miller is currently the President at Helping Immigrant Thrive, Inc. assisting undocumented immigrants in NYC become taxpaying members of the community.


Mr. Carbone paid tribute to Shelton Mayor, Mark Lauretti. The City of Shelton developed a philosophy for the town that is inclusive of all populations. Shelton has also strived to keep taxes low so they can all stay there and thrive.

<u>CT Labor Market:</u> Connecticut's labor force declined for the 7th consecutive month in July as employers face growing challenges filling the state's 91,000 job openings. Job openings are now 30% above pre-pandemic levels. Individuals working and those looking for work is down 59,000 individuals since January 2022.

CT has recovered 98% of the 289,100 jobs lost due to pandemic shutdowns. Other states in the northeast, namely Vermont and Rhode Island are still behind.

<u>Labor Market Trends:</u> The Labor Force includes people aged 16 and older who are actively looking for work.



<u>Connecticut Labor Force:</u> Since November 2021, the state has experienced a tight labor market where there are more jobs available than workers to fill them.

<u>Affordable Housing:</u> In the state budget Governor Lamont proposed investing \$600 million for affordable housing using a mix of state and federal resources, approximately doubling previous levels.

The investments include:

- \$100 million in down payment assistance to low and moderate-income homebuyers
- \$200 million for flexible housing & \$100 million for the Housing Trust Fund, with an emphasis on multi-unit housing in downtown areas close to transportation
- \$200 million to expand workforce development housing

Funding alone will not address immediate needs as housing takes time to create. Zoning concerns must be addressed, and financing needs to be put in place. There are multiple steps in each community to put a project forward.

Retail Concierge Academy (RCA): RCA is a \$750K pilot program funded by the state serving 100 people. RCA will provide individuals with the skills to create a better consumer experience by teaching techniques to become personal shoppers. Personal shoppers offer clients personalized advice based on several individualized factors. TWP will work directly with retailers, including those at the SoNo Collection sector partnership to develop a curriculum that is responsive to their needs.

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Mortgage Crisis Job Training Program(MCJTP): The MCJTP has helped CT residents stay in their homes since 2008 by enhancing job skills to improve earning potential and the ability to sustain a mortgage with affordable monthly payments. MCJTP has enrolled 3,414 individuals, 2,865 individuals obtained training scholarship, 3,348 went through financial literacy workshops and 2,402 were offered housing counseling.

Board Business:

<u>Minutes:</u> A motion made and seconded the Board of Directors accepted the minutes from the June 2023 BOD meeting.

<u>Executive Committee Appointments:</u> Dionne Pulcinella, Willie McBride and Meghan Hopkins On a motion made and seconded, the Board of Directors unanimously accepted the appointment for the three Board members to become member of the Executive Committee.

<u>Consent Agenda:</u> On a motion made and seconded, the Board of Directors unanimously accepted the Consent Agenda.

Operations Report

Ms. Parkmond began by introducing some of TWP's VP's: Mike Hayden, Sr. VP of Workforce Development, Cathy Patton, VP of Young Adult Services, Leigh Roberts, VP of Workforce Development and Mike McCarthy, VP of HR and Talent Development. Each of them shared information regarding their programs.

Mr. Hayden shared that TWP is collaborating with a company called Transfr to offer virtual reality training to students. Their mission is to train the future of every industry and open exciting new opportunities for talent across the globe and at home. Career pathways for workers who will be the future of every industry via hands on VR. Training technology. This training helps individuals see, try and get an understanding of various occupations and the tasks involved.

Ms. Patton shared insight on the youth division. Programs include:

- WIOA Youth (Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act)
- YouthBuild Bridgeport
- Bureau of Rehabilitation Services partnership
- Department of Children and Families partnership
- Building Better Futures
- American Rescue Plan Act- Youth
- Connecticut Youth Employment Program

These programs provide job training and employment opportunities for underserved youth, ages 16-21 while aiming to prepare them with future careers.

Mr. McCarthy provided an overview of the professional development trainings that TWP has been engaged in during and after the pandemic. Over 2000 hours of training has occurred for staff.

Ms. Roberts shared the programs within Health CareeRx Academy (HCA). HCA consists of the following programs: Career ConneCT, Community Health Worker and the Nursing Expansion Grant.

Occupational skills training options are: CNA, EMT, Community Health Worker, Sterile Processing Technique, Medical Assistant, Medical Administrative Assistant, Medical Billing and Coding, Pharmacy Tech, LPN and RN.

The HCA provides case management services to over 500 participants per year. Over 400 barrier removal services have been provided through stipends, gift cards, referrals, technology, and equipment this year.

Marketing Report

Mr. Long began his report by sharing organizations that are supporting TWP.

<u>We Change Lives:</u> Lockheed Martin has supported by providing resources for Apprentices for transportation, technology, work clothes and more.

<u>M&T Bank</u> provides access to Dynamic Works online programing to over 600 individuals across five states to expand their job skills and prepare them to re-enter the workforce. Courses support entry into various industries and focus on communications skills, and interpersonal skills including "Decision Making "and "Conflict Management". This also includes job seeker skills designed specifically for targeted populations such as veterans, re-entry, or workers with disabilities.

<u>Synchrony Bank</u> has assisted with operational support for Dress for Success by providing flexible funding for programming and support services.

Non-Profit Megaphone: \$90,000 in grant funds provided to promote our programs. TWP must maintain a click rate of 55 to maintain ads.

<u>Comcast:</u> Provided computers for 20 low-income, mature workers in Vermont to access job training, coaching and American Job Center programs.
